TOXIN ALERT

Many oven-safe and microwave "steam" bags can release fumes when heated that are generally safe to humans but toxic to birds. Birds have incredibly sensitive respiratory systems.



When in doubt, leave it out!

Safe alternatives are glass, ceramic, or stainless steel utensils

Unsafe options are roasting bags, slow-cooker liners, microwave steam bags, anything "non-stick."

From The Doctor's Desk

Parrots possess tetrachromatic vision, meaning they have four types of color-detecting cone cells in their retinas compared to humans' three, allowing them to perceive a broader spectrum that extends into the ultraviolet range that we cannot see. While humans see three primary colors (red, green, and blue), parrots have an additional UV-sensitive cone that reveals vibrant colors and patterns in feathers, food, and their environment that are completely invisible to us.

For example, what appears as brown Harrison's nuggets to humans actually appears purple to parrots due to these visual differences.

This extraordinary color vision plays a crucial role in mate selection, as many bird species have UV-reflective plumage patterns that help them identify healthy potential partners and communicate with flock members.

Understanding that parrots experience such a visually rich world helps explain why toys, foods, and stimulating environments are so important for their psychological well-being in captivity.



An Interesting Tidbit

Heavyweight champion boxer Mike Tyson has had a lifelong passion for raising and flying pigeons.
